





Natural gas pipelines




Pipelines — energy highways





Watercourse Crossing Guidelines

- 5th edition is currently under review to reflect changes to Fisheries Act of November 2013
- NEB responsible for assessing potential impacts on fisheries for NEB regulated projects
- Guidelines (PAWC) applies to new crossings under DFO authority.
- New guidelines will reflect requirements under the new Act
- New guidelines will improve self-assessment process by providing science-based guidance for pipeline industry

- Collaboration, transparency and credible engagement are critical factors to our success



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





Open cut method




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Isolated method
