DECISION AND ORDER – EB-2024-0325 ENBRIDGE GAS INC.

Decision on Enbridge's Application for an Exemption from Leave to Construct for the Glendale Community Expansion Project

On December 18, 2025, the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) issued its <u>Decision and Order</u> granting Enbridge Gas Inc.'s (Enbridge) application, under <u>section 95(2)</u> of the *Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998*, for an exemption from the requirement to obtain leave to construct for a proposed natural gas pipeline to serve customers in the Township of South Glengarry (the Project).

The Project is intended to connect approximately 128 residential homes in the Glendale Subdivision who do not currently have access to natural gas service. Expected to cost \$3.7 million, it is one of a number of projects elected to receive funding assistance under Phase 2 of the Government of Ontario's Natural Gas Expansion Program.¹

Under the applicable regulation, the OEB must grant an exemption if:

- The proposed pipeline is projected to cost more than \$2 million and less than \$10 million, and
- The OEB is satisfied that the Crown's duty to consult, if it applies in respect of the application, has been adequately discharged.

The OEB was satisfied that Enbridge followed the <u>Environmental Guidelines</u> with respect to Indigenous consultation and found that the duty to consult had been adequately discharged. The OEB also stated that it expects Enbridge to continue engaging, as appropriate, with the Huron-Wendat Nation and the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, the two Indigenous communities identified by the Ministry of Energy and Mines as potentially affected for the duration of the Project.

Independence in the hearing and determination of matters is a key element of the OEB's mandate, established through legislative structures, the Memorandum of Understanding between the Minister of Energy and Mines and the Chair of the OEB, and by-laws that set out clear lines of communication between government and the OEB. Commissioner panels hear and determine matters independently, with legislative protections and other instruments to ensure decisions are free from interference by the CEO, the Board of Directors and government. This also includes the Chief Commissioner when not assigned to the specific case.
